1. Read the following passage and answer the questions that follow.

Fellow Ugandans, you will agree that cross generation affairs portray a very bad example to much younger children who may have looked at these practitioners as their role models in various spheres .This is reason enough to get you on board against the practice.

Young girls have lost their precious future as a result of cross generation affairs. They end up obsessed with the associated short term enjoyments and forget all about studies and their future in general .But sincerely ,why should one be unfocused enough to waste all their years and future just because of these short lived gains? Unwanted pregnancies are witnessed due to cross generation affair. They act as blockades in pursuit of academic continuity and excellence since the victims at times get expelled from their respective institutions of learning and lose trust of their parents and guardians .This practice is steadily increasing the single parenthood-especially the single mothers. Poor girls go back to their parents frustrated, grumbling and with a child and HIV/AIDS. One can avoid these by saying no to cross generation affairs.

Resentment and lack of marriage partners among young people is associated with cross generation affairs. They are the leading instigators of abortions today. Thousands of young women have died due to abortions. For those who by luck are still living, are nursing internal wounds. Many people have lost their marriages and have had their families shattered because of this vice. There is a way it has promoted immorality and waywardness among young people. They pick up habits like nudity to attract sugar daddies .Some men have lost lives when materialistic girls poison or murder them so as to take their hardearned assets or cash.

One wonders why young girls have fallen victims of cross generation affairs .There is a lot to attribute this to. Young women get involved in cross generation affairs basically for financial gains. They want to acquire luxurious products, to study ,buy house hold items and other amenities which older men are willing to provide.

Some parents promote cross generation affairs by accepting gifts from these older men. Parents do not discourage their daughters from such engagements. Sometimes girls crave for emotional support from grown up men. They have a desire of finding 'parents' in mature partners.

It is clear that many parents, nowadays, do not have time for their children and do not care about how they live .This non involvement of parents promotes the vice.

A group of young women revealed that the reason for their involvement in cross generation affairs was the belief that older men are a form of 'insurance' for the future in terms of marriage. They also reason that older men will accept financial responsibility.

Dissatisfaction in marriage compels men to leave their spouses and look for young girls who will give them the best treatment and respect. Young women are targets because some men think that happiness is synonymous with them. Girls are considered more attractive and lovely than the aging wives.

Older men attach value to such affairs because they are a sign of high status. They love being associated with the classy learned women from higher institutions of learning.

2. (A) Read the passage below and answer the questions that follows it.

The third great defect of our civilization is that it does not know what to do with its knowledge. Science has given us power fit for the gods, yet we use them like small children. For example, we do not know how to manage our machines .Machines were made to be man's servants, yet he has grown so **dependent** on them that they are in a fair way to become his masters. Already most men spend most of their lives looking after and waiting upon machine. And the machines are very stern masters. They must be with coal, and given petrol to drink, and oil to wash with, and 'they must be kept at the light temperature and if they do not get their meals when they expect them, they **grow sulky** and refuse to work or burst with rage, and blow up, and spread ruin and destruction all round them .So we have to wait upon them very attentively and do all that we can to keep them in a good temper. Already we find it difficult either to work or play without the machines, and a time may come when they will rule us altogether, just as we rule the animals.

And this brings me to the point at which I asked, "what do we do with all the time which the machines have saved for us, and the new energy they have given us?" On the whole, it **must be admitted**, we do very little. For the most part we use our time and energy to make more and better machines, but more and better machines will only give us still more energy, and what are we to do with them? The answer, I think is that we should try to become more civilized, for the machines themselves, and the power which the machines have given us, are not civilization but aids to civilization. But you will remember that we agreed at the beginning that being civilized meant making and linking beautiful things, thinking freely, and living rightly

and maintaining justice equally between man and man. Man has a better <u>chance</u> today to do these things than he ever had before. He has more time, more energy, less to fear and less to fight against. If he will give his time and energy which his machines have won for him for making more beautiful things, to finding out more and more about the universe, to removing the causes of quarrels between nations, to discovering how to prevent poverty, then I think our civilization would undoubtedly be the greater, as it would be the most lasting that there has ever been.
